Festive Magnitudes

Diwali - November 12: The Diwali festival known as the Festival of Lights, symbolizes the triumph of light over darkness and good over evil.

Chhath Puja - November 17 -20: It is primarily celebrated in North India dedicated to worshipping the sun god, as a gesture of gratitude and thankfulness for bestowing the bounties of life upon the earth.

Children's Day - 14 November: This day celebrates the birth anniversary of India's first Prime Minister, Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru. It is a day dedicated to honour Nehru ji and prioritise the well-being of children through various events and activities.

Gurupurab - November 27: Gurunanak Jayanti commemorates the birth of Guru Nanak Dev Ji, the founder of Sikhism. This sacred occasion is traditionally marked by prayers, processions, and community meals at gurdwaras.

Campus Clandestine
